FROM THE DESK OF THE RABBI

Ayin L'tzion – Celebrating Israel

Dy the time you receive your April Dnewsletter, Passover will just be end-

ing. You will have sat around your Seder table, with family and friends, and told once again the 5,000 year old ancient story of our slavery, the 10 plaques, our Exodus from Egypt and our wandering in the desert. 5,000 years ago, the goal of our people was an Exodus from the depths of enslavement and a vision pointed toward Israel. Think back now to the very last words of the Hagqadah- Next Year in Jerusalem.

This month, our eyes turn to the fulfillment of that age old dream. Our history tells us it took a few tries. We crossed the Jordan and settled the land. Solomon built the Temple, considered to be one in our generation to have Israel as part of lives. of the wonders of the world, but it fell to the Babylonians. So we tried again when we built the second Temple, only to see it fall I hope that you will join us on April 15 when we will gather on to the Romans. Yet, for the next 2,000 years there was not a moment, even in our darkest times, when we did not have an eve on returning the Israel. And then, there it was, when on May 14th, 1948, David Ben Gurion stirringly proclaimed our return to Israel.

This month, we begin our celebrations of that moment, 70 years ago, what it meant to us then and what it means to us now. It is staggering to realize all that our Israel has given to the world and to us in this short time. In every decade Israel has had to fight in one way or another to continue to be the home for every Celebrate with us! one of us. Israel has gathered our people literally from the darkness to the light and from the four corners of the earth. In those Rabbi Nesson

years, Israel has also earned Nobel prize winners in Medicine, Chemistry, Economics, Physics and Literature. Israel leads the world in Medical Research, in Pharmaceutical Research, in computer development and more. The cell phone, voice mail, and a long list of other technologies we take for granted are gifts to the world from there.

More than that, Israel is our home, the home to every Jewish person in the world, from the spiritual high of spending Shabbat in Jerusalem, to the White City of Tel Aviv, to the desert which now blooms. Whenever someone returns from their first journey to Israel, they will tell me, "from the minute my feet touched the ground, I felt like I was home." That feeling should be in all of our hearts, along with the realization of just how blessed we are

In Israel's National Anthem, Hatikvah (The Hope) we sing these words: Od lo avdah tikvatienu, Avin LeTzion Tzofia... As long we look to Zion, our hope as a people will always be strong.

In the Middle East, a country was reborn after 2000 years in exile. David Ben Gurion stood in what is now Independence Hall in Tel Aviv and declared,

"The Land of Israel was the birthplace of the Jewish people. Here their spiritual, religious and political identity was shaped."

He closed the declaration as follows:

"This recognition by the United Nations of the right of the Jewish people to establish their State is irrevocable. This right is the natural right of the Jewish people to be masters of their own fate, like all other nations, in their own sovereign State."

The people in the street cheered and celebrated, but their cheers were soon overpowered by the sounds of tanks and qunfire from the united attack on the fledgling state by five Arab armies.





Religious School News

From Karen Lilienfeld, Director of Education and Life Long Learning for Youth & Their Families

The highest activity a human being can attain is learning for understanding, because to understand is to be free. (Baruch Spinoza, Ethics) Our MJCBY students are taught to question. Questions may build or diminish. As people of "The Book," we value the layers of understandings which grow from studying & challenging one another while engaging with Torah. In fact, this is precisely why Torah has always been & continues to be central to our lives. Just as rain water comes down in drops & forms rivers, so with Torah. One studies a bit today & some more tomorrow, until in time it becomes like a flowing stream." (Song of Songs Rabbah)

"The idea that it's possible to move from slavery to freedom & from darkness to light & from despair to hope- that is the greatest Jewish story ever told." said Rabbi Sharon Brous. Each generation must learn anew how to overcome the wrongs of the world. Children will never be born into a perfect world created for them by their parents. They can only continue to hold the torch & their parents' role is to teach them how to carry on the fight for justice. That is why the Passover ritual is central to Judaism. The Torah teaches, whoever does not keep it, will be cast out & no longer be considered a part of Israel. The premise of Judaism is: If you are to be part of the people, you must struggle to maintain or realize freedom your entire life.

Two modern holidays commemorate the tragedy of the Holocaust & the triumph of the State of Israel; *Yom Hashoah* - Holocaust Remembrance Day & *Yom Ha'Atzmaut* - Israel Independence Day. Both are observed in the Jewish community & have great significance for secular Jews. Yom Hashoah is the shorter form of Yom Hashoah Ve-Heguvurah, which translates into the Day of Remembrance of the Holocaust & Heroism. This solemn day arrives one week after Pesach & coincides with the Warsaw Ghetto uprising of 1943. On Holocaust Remembrance Day, Jews of all ages come together to remember this painful history & to understand the watchfulness necessary to ensure it never happens again. At the same time, we could use this event as a time to explore the question: Who are we as Jews & as human beings if we look away from the suffering of others?

Israel, whatever flaws, is the antidote to the Holocaust; the dream made real from out of the ashes. Judaism thrives on questions. I encourage MJCBY families to use Yom Ha'Atzmaut, as an opportunity to celebrate Israel's many accomplishments. On Sunday, April 15, all students from MJCBY Religious School, Mount Freedom Jewish Center Religious School, & the Religious School students from Temple B'nai Or will come together, to celebrate Israel at 70. This event celebrates Israel's Music, Art, History & diversity from antiquity to the present. Children will visit 7 stations to experience some of the wonders of our homeland.
