FROM THE DESK OF THE RABBI

THE VIEW FROM THE TOP

There is mountain in Jordan called Mt. Nevo. If you are enough of a traveler to take the journey there, you will be able

to see an extraordinary sight. You will see, with your eyes, what Moses saw just before he died. I know, because I saw it too. It was on a trip to Jordan from Israel in the days when such journeys were not only possible, they were even easy to arrange.

At the end of the book of Deuteronomy, which we read every year as summer comes to an end and the holidays approach, the Torah tells the story.

G-d brings Moses to the top of this mountain and tells him to look north and south and east and west. What Moses saw, from this vantage point, in every direction was all of the promised land laid out before him. In looking straight ahead, Moses saw the plains and the city of Jericho right before his eyes, so close, he could almost touch it. On a clear day, you can stand on that mountain today and see the Dead Sea and you can see Jerusalem.

What Moses saw was not just the land. He also saw the future. He knew that the Israelites would soon cross the Jordan river below him, and inherit the land promised long ago to Abraham. In this land we would, for the first time, be handed the opportunity to put into place the ethics, morals and teachings of G-d, from the Ten Commandments to the reminder how to treat the stranger in our midst, because we knew and remembered what it meant to be a slave. We would be offered the opportunity to live lives of meaning.

Moses was 120 years old on that day, the day he stood on the top of that mountain, yet, says the Torah, his eyes were still clear and his strength was still vital.

It was 120 years ago this coming January that our congregation was founded. The leaders in those days saw a future for the Jewish community in Morristown, but I wonder if they had any sense that 120 years later that not only would we still be here, but like Moses, our strength would still be vital and our eyes still clearly focused • • on who we are today and who will be 120 years from now. This year will be dedicated to renewing that vision of old and paving the path for the future.

For us, with Rosh Hashanah on the door step, we are, all of us standing with Moses on that mountain. It is the time to ask- what do you see? It is time for us as individuals not only to look around, but more importantly to look inside. As we climb that summit, we ask about inner lives. What have been our successes? and our failures?

The mountain is front us. As the New Year begins, let's reach WHAT MOSES SAW, AND WHAT DO YOU inside with our vigor and our strength to make this New Year, our 70th in a renewed Jewish state, our 120th as a congregation and community, and our individual years, one in which we will be blessed and challenged, like Moses, to see a year filled with blessing and health.

Wishing you all a happy and healthy new year.

We Pray

long time ago, I learned in a class

that all our prayers can be placed into three basic general categories: appreciation, amazement and requests. These categories can best summed up with a single expressive word each: "Thanks" - הודאות hoda'ot, "Help?" בקשות - bakashot and "Wow!" ברכות - b'rakhot.

Initially, I have to admit, I felt some resistance to these categories, which I saw as over simplification. Aren't our prayers and wishes, reflecting the deepest wishes of our souls, the contradictions in our lives, our difficult history and the needs of our ever-changing communities, far more complex than that?

But the more I taught, not only the texts of our prayers and the more I learned about spontaneous prayer through the chaplaincy training program, I participated in a few years ago, the more I found these three categories to be helpful jumping off points for articulating just what it is our prayers express. Even at this time of year, when so many of us come together as a community for a few days of intense prayer, these three categories can apply to the mood and our thoughts as we count the changing of another year. A few examples:

Thank You for the opportunities that have been presented to us over the past year.

Thank You for all we have learned, and everything that has helped us grow.

Thank You for helping us overcome challenges and difficulties in the past year. Thank You for protecting us and our loved ones through the dangers, near-misses, close calls -- both those of which we were aware and those of which we were blissfully ignorant.

Thank You for giving us strength to recover from our injuries and illnesses.

Thank You for the caring community of people around us.

Thank you for the gifts of the people we

What We Say When love in our lives: those whom we have lost in the past year, those who have come into our lives in the past year, and those have been with us for years and who we hope will stay with us in the future.

Help us to heal from the damages of this

Help us to forgive those who have hurt us. Help us to be more aware of the harm we may cause others and to make amends. Help us to learn from those around us. Help us to have the courage to face whatever is ahead of us in the coming vear.

Help us to listen and understand. Help us to manage the difficulties of our illnesses or long-term health conditions. Help us to find ways to help others.

Wow -- the growth, accomplishments, courage, and compassion of our children and grandchildren continue to surpass our expectations.

Wow -- there is joy and love in the world, despite what we often read or hear in the

Wow -- the human ability to adapt to

change is amazing.

Wow -- the drive to participate in tikkun olam, repair of the world, continues to grow, and its effects can be seen and felt. Wow -- it's amazing that we are still able to come together here today as a Jewish community, despite all the challenges Jews have faced throughout history and continue to face today.

NEW YEAR'S MESSAGE FROM THE EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR

As we enter the new year, my thoughts dwell upon being Jewish and what it means:

To me, being Jewish means recognizing my responsibility during my lifetime. Being Jewish means affirming life and the moral choice each of us has, to bring us all a little closer for a world at peace and in harmony.

Being Jewish means celebrating the fact that Jews were the original revolutionaries - the first to challenge the status quo and insist on the right to worship differently than the majority, while still being treated equally under the law. Today, we call this pluralism, and it is a bedrock principle of democratic societies.

To me, being Jewish means welcoming the pioneering Jewish effort to establish a universal moral code of conduct, where previously there was none to speak of. It's not by accident that America's Founding Fathers chose the words of Leviticus for our nation's Liberty Bell: "Proclaim liberty throughout all the land and unto all the inhabitants thereof."

To me, being Jewish means pursuing justice, to treat my neighbor as I would wish to be treated, to welcome the stranger in our midst, to be sensitive to the environment and to seek peace.

To me, being Jewish means the joy of belonging and community wherever I go; the meaningful and symbol-laden annual holiday cycle; the extraordinary contribution of the Jewish people to advancing the frontiers of world civilization; and the admirable, almost unimaginable, determination to persevere against all odds.

To me, being Jewish means knowing that in fighting against anti-Semitism and for Israel's right to live in peace and security, I am affirming the highest values of tolerance and democracy for all.

To me, being Jewish means pride in the immense Jewish contribution to the defense of human dignity and human rights. Not by accident, the Hebrew Bible — from the exodus from Egypt to the very concept of the Promised Land — was a source of inspiration for the American civil rights movement. Strikingly, Jews have never been satisfied with things as they are.

And finally, as Nobel laureate Elie Wiesel once said, to me, being Jewish means not necessarily seeking to make the world more Jewish, but rather more human. That is the goal animating our people, through good times and bad, from the very beginning of this extraordinary historical journey to the present day.






This year we welcome Tomer Speier, who will be teaching in our religious school and participating in many congregation events.



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
