

#### FROM THE DESK OF THE RABBI

#### 'Hazak Ve'ematz- Be Strong'

In 1974, Bob Dylan released his now famous song "Forever Young." By that time Dylan was a father of four children and according to the lore of

"Forever Young," he composed the lyrics as a blessing to his youngest son, Jakob. Despite the title, the song actually centers on Dylan's hopes for the kind of human being his son will grow up to become over time. In particular, he asks (or maybe prays?), "May you always be courageous / Stand upright and be strong."

It is that word 'strong' that catches my attention. As the summer comes to a close, so does the cycle of reading through the Torah, and Dylan's words (perhaps purposefully) echo Moses's words to Joshua as he prepares to give over leadership of the people.

Hazak Ve'ematz, be strong and resolute.

As the high holidays approach and we reflect on the year that has passed, all of us know and feel a new reality, both as Americans and as Jews. It is a reality that not one of us would have dreamed of, nor imagined for ourselves. Our country doesn't feel as safe as it used to be, neither as Americans nor as Jews.

So I put on the table our theme for the year- 'As Strong As Ever' and put before us this question- what gives us the courage to face these uncertain times?

Our history has guided us. Through every trial, we remind ourselves of those words of Moses- Hazak- be strong- Ve'ematz- and resolute.

In the year that will soon begin, let's remind ourselves of how much we have to lean on and how much we have to teach the world about living in uncertain times, of those things that bring value to our lives, personally, as Americans and as Jews.

Let's enter this year reminding ourselves- we are as strong as ever.

with the music and text of Kabbalat Shabbat and Ma'ariv services on Friday evening is my favorite moment of the week. The texts evocative of the majesty and power of God's creation as we see it in the natural world, the tunes that are catchy and easy to sing along with and beautiful, the flickering beauty of the candle light, the service that lasts only about an hour or so, all while the setting sun creates gorgeous colors through the stained glass of our historic synagogue's beautiful chapel and front doors. I'd like to share the following story with you, which I believe really sets the tone for the upcoming High Holy Days, or more specifically, the Yamim Noraim or "Days of Awe."

Once upon a time, a few weeks before the High Holy Days, G-d spoke to one of his angels and said, "For this Rosh Hashanah, I want you to bring me the most precious thing in the world." The angel bowed low, accepted the assignment, and flew to Earth to get started. The angel knew that G-d did not always give detailed instructions and hoped that completing this assignment would not be too difficult. What is the most precious thing in the world, he wondered, but no obvious answer came, so he started looking.

He searched around the beautiful mountains and lakes, flew to the top of tall peaks and swam to the bottom of the deep waters, without success. One afternoon, it started to rain, and as the rain moved across the mountains, the sun came out and the angel saw something amazing...a giant rainbow that spread from one end of the horizon to the other. Not sure how to bring a piece of the rainbow to G-d, the angel grabbed a few rain drops, returned to G-d and told the story to him. G-d replied, "A rainbow is indeed beautiful and fleeting, but it is not the most precious thing in the world. Keep looking!"

The angel flew back to Earth and started looking inside buildings, hoping to find something precious. In a small, rural town, he searched houses and offices, where he found happy people, sad people,

but nothing precious. Then, one night, he noticed a light in the window and discovered a woman smiling in a way the angel had never seen. The woman was cradling an infant in her arms and she was playing with the baby's small hands and feet. The angel knew that the woman's smile was extremely precious. Quietly, the angel borrowed one of the mother's smiles. Upon being presented with the mother's smile, G-d said, "Indeed, this is something beautiful and precious, but it is not the most precious thing in the world. You are headed in the right direction. Keep looking."

Disappointed, the angel flew back to Earth, wondering where to look next. He searched all over the city. One afternoon, while taking a break at a street corner, the angel noticed a blind man with a cane, waiting to cross the street. As the traffic light went through many cycles, many people walked past the man, not even noticing him. Then a young girl walked up to the man and said shyly..."May I help you across the street?" The man breathed a sigh of relief and thanked the girl for caring about him.

Excitedly, the angel flew back to G-d with the story of the young girl and blind man. This kind of deed- a mitzvah- must be the most precious thing in the world, but when presented to G-d, he said, "A mitzvah is indeed very special and important, but it is not the most precious thing in the world. I want you to look one more time. Look everywhere, but especially in the hearts of people. I am sure you will succeed."

By this time, the angel was almost exasperated. Usually, angels have an easy time pleasing G-d, but this month has been a tough one. Determined not to give up, the angel again flew back to Earth to keep looking. Before he began to look, he decided to rest on a park bench. Soon after sitting down, the angel heard

sobs from a crying man on an adjacent bench. Curious, the angel went over to the man, who was writing in his journal, as the tears flowed down his cheeks. As the angel leaned over the man to see what he was writing, he read "Rosh Hashanah is approaching and my relationship with my brother is still strained. We haven't spoken or seen each other in months. Will he ever forgive me for how I treated him this summer?" As the man wrote this last sentence, he paused and looked up, and began writing again. "He won't forgive me until I ask him to, until I tell him how sorry I am for what I did. I must find a way to tell him how sorry I am that my anger has caused so much unhappiness."

Another tear rolled down the man's cheek. But before it could reach the pages of his journal, the angel quickly reached out and caught it. The angel hoped and prayed that his search was over. When he presented the man's tear to G-d, G-d said, "My faithful angel, this is indeed the most precious thing in the whole world... the tear of someone who is truly sorry. It is a tear from the heart, and it will bring peace into the world. The two brothers will forgive each other and they will enjoy a loving and happy new year. My dear angel, I bless you for your good work. Now, go tell this story to others, so that all who hear it can learn from it.

This story is based on a Chasidic tale and has an important message for Yamim Noraim. It highlights one of the major themes for Rosh Hashanah and Yom Kippur...the theme of Repentance or Teshuvah. Our tradition teaches that repentance is so important that it is considered one of three things that can affect the divine decree of judgment. The words of the Unetaneh Tokef solemnly declare: "Let us proclaim the sacred power of this day; it is awesome and full of dread. For on this day your dominion is exalted,

your throne established in steadfast love; there in truth you reign. In truth you are judge and arbiter, counsel and witness. On Rosh Hashanah it is written, on Yom Kippur it is sealed: How many shall pass on, how many shall come to be, who shall live and who shall die. But Teshuvah, Tefilah and Tzedakah temper judgment's severe decree."

Repentance is not a word that we use often during the rest of the year. For some, it falls into a category of religious language that borders on inaccessibility; or meaninglessness. For others, it has connotations of Christian evangelism. But the concept of repentance is of grave importance for us Jews at this time of the year.

The root of the word teshuvah has the connotation of "turning" or "returning." The man in the story was writing about teshuvah, turning to his brother and turning towards G-d. Our tradition teaches that the type of teshuvah we should do depends on the sin committed. For sins against G-d, we ask for forgiveness on Yom Kippur. But for sins against our fellow human beings, we must ask for forgiveness from those we have wronged. While the concept of asking G-d for forgiveness for sins against G-d is relatively straightforward, the concept of asking others for forgiveness is a classic case of something that is easier said than done. Most of our sins against others happen in our closest relationships-in our relationships with those who are most important in our lives. And by its very nature, such close relationships are tangled. Often, both parties in a relationship have responsibility for the way we behave inside that relationship. This makes the process of teshuvah very complicated. We feel upset, or quilty, and we want to apologize, but we are not sure what to apologize for.

Therefore, the pain and hurt, and this confusion of feelings can prevent us from taking the first step.

The stories of our lives are complicated, they have a history; they cannot be unraveled with simple answers and simple lessons. It is with these complex realities in mind that the rabbis, over many generations, have developed the themes and traditions of Rosh Hashanah and Yom Kippur. These holy days can hold power over even the most complex challenges in our own lives.

We find comfort in the fact that others around us are going through the process of self-reflection and teshuvah at the same time as we are. We find solace in the music and prayers that are chanted and read by Jews around the world. We find strength in a 3,000 year old tradition that gives us a framework for repairing the damage in our lives that has been carried over the past year.

As we go through this cathartic introspection, let us mimic the behavior of two characters in the story. Let us mimic the angel by searching relentlessly for the things that are most important in our lives. And let us mimic the man on the park bench who finds the strength to reach out to a loved one who is far away. While neither of these tasks is easy, surely, both of them will go a long way towards making the next year a Shana Tova.

For Rosh Hashanah, we extend the following greeting to you: SHANA TOVA U'METUKAH.

Between Rosh Hashanah and Yom Kippur, our hopes to you are for a: G'MAR CHATIMAH TOVA.



OUR GIFT TO YOU

Chesed means "kindness" in Hebrew. The word can also be translated as "lovingkindness," to convey the deep love that animates Jewish acts of kindness, done without thought of reward.

The Bible has numerous examples of chesed, such as Abraham and Sarah welcoming three strangers to their tent in the heat of the day, Abraham's servant's prayer for a wife for Isaac, answered by Rebecca who offers water to him and to his camels; and Ruth, who shows loyally and kindness to Naomi, adopting her religion and peoplehood, after Naomi has experienced great loss. The rabbinic tradition enacted many laws to formalize our commitment to kindness, making chesed one of the three central pillars of Jewish life, as Shimon HaTzaddik taught: "The world rests on three things, on Torah, on service of God, and on deeds of kindness" (Pirkei Avot 1:2).

The 5780 (2019-2020) Torah Fund pin depicts a heart surrounded by three circles, one larger than the next. This symbolizes the heart of kindness, which Jews enact in ever-widening realms of generosity: from family, to community, to the larger world; from North America, to Israel, to the world; or from sisterhood, to region, to the larger world of Women's League for Conservative Judaism. And as it is said in Psalm 99, may we build a world of kindness.

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

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
