

FROM THE RELIGIOUS SCHOOL



As we are heading into December, we are heading into the Jewish month of Kislev and towards the 25th of Kislev when many Jewish children's favorite Jewish holiday, Hanukkah, will begin. Hanukkah is a rather minor Jewish holiday, yet it is at or near the top in rec-

ognition and popularity. But, is it really? Is what so many Jews and non-Jews think about Hanukkah actually Hanukkah? Just as many of my more value-oriented Christian friends are striving to bring Christ back into Christmas, instead of X'ing it out into Xmas as the world so seems to be literally and figuratively doing, I am encouraging us to dedicate ourselves to bringing Hanukkah back into Hanukkah.

Hanukkah is basically about two miracles – the miracle of the oil – and the miracle of us standing up for our religious freedom, fighting back, and winning against all odds. Traditionally at Hanukkah, we retell the story as a way, hopefully, to remind us of these miracles. Often, though, many seem to focus today not on the miracles of Hanukkah and not on the message of rededicating ourselves, of standing up for our Religious Freedom,... - but most today seem to focus on that which really isn't Hanukkah.

On the extreme, some today set-up and decorate what in more recent years they have created and called a Hanukkah Bush, but that is not a part of Hanukkah. Some of us have even heard tales on a popular Saturday night television show of our youth about a man dressed in blue who delivers presents – of course not to be confused with the other big guy dressed in red – this guy in blue was called Hanukkah Harry. Despite his name, though, he is not an actual part of Hanukkah.

What most call Hanukkah today is not what it once was. There are so many misunderstandings and misrepresentations especially about Hanukkah – and it seems that is only growing more so with time. As already noted, Hanukkah is a minor holiday, not a major one. Many Jews who celebrate Hanukkah in some fashion do not also celebrate the multitude of holidays that are more major ones.

Even how we traditionally do celebrate has some confusion. An important part of Hanukkah is the lighting of the special candelabra. Technically, though, what we are lighting at Hanukkah is not what most call a Menorah. A Menorah is a candelabra with seven candles, three on each side and one in the center. What most at Hanukkah call a Menorah, a candelabra

with nine candles, four on each side and one in the center, is more technically correctly a Hanukkah Menorah or Hanukkiah, not a regular Menorah.

One of the most famous *machlokot*, disagreements, in Judaism has to do with Hanukkah – which way should we light our candles? The shamash plus one on the first night, two on the second, ..., and eight on the eighth? – or the shamash plus eight on the first, seven on the second, ..., and one on the eighth? Rabbi Shamai found the latter to be more appropriate as the olive oil was becoming less and less with each progressing day. Rabbi Hillel found the former to be more appropriate, though, as the miracle was becoming greater and greater with each progressing day. Rabbi Shamai may have been technically quite accurate, but Rabbi Hillel looked with more depth and meaning – and his approach came to be the modern norm. Either way, Hanukkah is quite genuinely about the miracle of the oil and the miracle of the victory, and lighting a Hanukkiah is particularly appropriate on Hanukkah.

While lighting the Hanukkiah, reciting the brachot, and retelling the story are authentically Hanukkah, another modern "part" of Hanukkah that really isn't Hanukkah is gifts. Presents do not equal love. If we are going to give presents at Hanukkah, the best presents we can give is our presence. We should consider spending time more than spending money. Perhaps we can come home early and spend more quality time with our loved ones? Perhaps if we are going to give, then we can give to those in need. Giving *Tzedakah* can be especially meaningful at Hanukkah. Perhaps give toys, blankets, and other items to those in need. Hanukkah, though, is not actually about gifts. Hanukkah is supposed to be a spiritual holiday and not a commercial one. I'm not saying that I have not been known to share special gifts with loved ones, but it is, I think, important to note that Hanukkah really is not about such tangible gifts.

Similarly, I may enjoy my versions of levivot/latkes and *soufganiyot*, and they certainly can help us think of olive oil and remember the miracle of the oil, but for accuracy's sake it is worth noting that Judah and the rest of the Maccabees did not eat potato pancakes or jelly donuts. They didn't even play dreidel! In fact, Hanukkah is also not actually about playing dreidel. Our ancestors had been prohibited from studying Torah; dreidels were used to fool the Greeks to think we were playing and not studying! Standing up for our right to study Torah, though, is therefore a far more authentically meaningful way to celebrate Hanukkah than by playing gambling games with spinning tops.

Thus, this Hanukkah, I encourage us all to spend some of our holiday actually studying Torah. I am encouraging us to bring Hanukkah back to true Jewish values. I am encouraging us to bringing Hanukkah back into Hanukkah. The essence of the Hanukkah story is that a small group of Jews stood up to those trying to keep them from holding on to their age-old authentic Jewish beliefs. Thus, perhaps we can better honor the heroes of the Hanukkah story, perhaps we can be more like the Maccabees, by bringing Hanukkah, "dedication," back into Hanukkah. Hanukkah means "dedication." That is what Hanukkah is about - "dedication" or "rededication." Hanukkah is about the rededication of the Ner Tamid and the Holy Temple. Hanukkah is about rededicating ourselves to G-d and to Torah. Perhaps we can rededicate ourselves to the ancient origins of this special holiday. We are to bring more light into this world. While the light at Hanukkah is the Hanukkiah, the light all year round is the Torah. We are to be a light unto the nations – Ohr Lagoyim.

While Hanukkah is definitely not Christmas and not even "Jewish Christmas," perhaps it could also serve us well to remember that Christmas is about a nice Jewish boy trying to teach others to connect more back to G-d and to Torah?


It is customary to dedicate a Kiddush on Shabbat in honor of a special occasion.






