

FROM THE DESK OF THE RABBI



It was at 9:45 am on Saturday October 27, 2018, while we here at our Jewish Center were beginning our Shabbat service and a bat mitzvah, that the Etz Chaim Synagogue in Pittsburgh was just beginning its Shabbat service, with a simcha about to begin there too. A 46 year-old man whose

name, like Haman's should be both remembered and forgotten, announced to the world 'I'm going in,' and then with an automatic rifle and several handguns, entered the synagogue and murdered 11 Jewish adults, ranging in age from 54 to 97, and wounded six others. The Anti-Defamation League (ADL) called this the deadliest attack of Jews in the history of the United States.

Last year the Jewish community gathered en masse on the following Shabbat, joined with our friends from other faiths and from all around the community, for a Shabbat of Solidarity, under the name #Show Up for Shabbat.

This year, our Jewish Center will once again gather on Friday night and on Saturday morning, October 25 and 26, in solidarity. We will remember those whose lives were lost. We will thank the first responders and others for their immediate and brave response.

I don't remember which Jewish scholar once wrote that there is no real way to understand anti-Semitism except to say that it is the longest running social pathology in history. And our friends in Pittsburg, were murdered for one reason, simply because they were Jews, at the hand of a man infected with anti-Semitic, racism, and xenophobic hatred.

They were murdered, in the words of the perpetrator, 'because they were part of a Jewish civilization that welcomes the stranger and cares for those in need.'

The 11 who died, were to their families, fathers and mothers, husbands and wives, grandparents and great-grandparents, brothers and sisters. They were the people who welcomed you at the front door, the joyful participants and the able leaders.

We, the Jewish community know that we are all bound together. When we gather for Show Up For Shabbat, we will gather to remind ourselves to be proud, unabashedly proud, as a Jewish community. We will be thankful for our neighbors and friends who will join us.

Please accept this invitation to join us at Friday night services October 25 and Saturday October 26. Also, please invite your friends from other faiths (or of no faith) to join us.

Etz Chaim Hee... In this way we will be a tree of life. Rabbi Nesson

From our Administrator



In September 1996, at Princeton University's 250th anniversary, author and Nobel Laureate, Toni Morrison, OBM, addressed the community, of which I was fortunate to be a part. She poetically talked about the role of the University which she defined as a continuum of the wisdom of

the deceased, combined with the energy of the living.

How aptly her metaphor defined the hallowed halls of Princeton University, but also the enduring nature of the Jewish religion. As individuals, members of a family and members of a community, we also represent the continuum about which Ms. Morrison spoke. We carry within us, L'Dor V'Dor, from generation to generation, an accumulation of knowledge and wisdom sealed by the hopes and dreams of our ancestors. At times, this inter-generational package is a tremendous burden and at other times it is a wonderful gift. The challenge for each generation is to find ways of adding to the structure and purpose of our Jewish continuum prior to passing it on to the next generation.

Our personal and collective efforts to extend this continuum are best witnessed by the thriving vitality at MJCBY. Focus on how many generations of families still belong. So much of our Jewish life is centered around this institution that its importance is often taken for granted. Count the ways the synagogue plays a part in our lives. It is a place where our babies are named and our children come of age; a place where we marry and we mourn. It is a place where the community prays and plays. It offers secular and Jewish education for pre-schoolers as well as Hebrew and Judaic studies for all ages. It welcomes newcomers, reaches out to the lonely and comforts the elderly, the grieving and the infirm. It is the central focus for perpetuating our Jewish traditions and for maintaining its vibrancy. To further strengthen the foundation, it is in need of your support.

As your Synagogue Administrator, I ask that you recognize the important part that our synagogue plays in your own life, the lives of your family members, and the lives of the community's Jewish and inter-faith communities. It is a place of enormous energy, but its own power can only be sustained by the endeavors and efforts of its members. Prior to making your donation to this year's Kol Nidre Appeal, please take time to contemplate the energy you derive from MJC and how your energy and contribution can perpetuate the synagogue's relevancy for future generations.



Religious School News



Ever since I was a little boy, I loved the Jewish calendar. As a student, it made so much more sense to me that the new year would begin at the start of the school year and not in the middle during winter vacation.

For Jewish day school teachers, it is usually difficult to get much GOoD education done when school may be in session, then out of session, then in session, then out of session, and so forth for the first weeks of the year.

With Rosh HaShanah not starting until sundown on September 29, our fabulous faculty are able to be providing some meaningful and engaging class sessions in preparation of the Holidays and not in catch-up mode after. What a benefit it is for us to have this month of educational opportunity building into the High Holy Days. Some may call this educational time September, and inaccurate they are not. More poignant for us, however, is that these lovely weeks of learning leading up to Tishrei when the High Holy Days begin is the heartfelt month of Elul.

It is traditional during Elul that each morning we blow the shofar in preparation towards the Head of the Year - 5780 soon to begin. Why, though, do we blow the shofar? On our Opening Day of Religious School, as I held up my big, beautiful Yeminite shofar, I asked everyone what it was in my hand. A multitude of enthusiastic responses appropriately called out, "Shofar! It's a shofar!" While right they were, I then asked, "Are you sure it's not an alarm clock?" Thus, our communal lesson continued with the theme, that a shofar can be seen as an alarm clock. Whether we are blowing it each day (although not on Shabbat or the last day of Elul before Tishrei) through the month of Elul or whether we are blowing it on Rosh HaShanah itself, it can be seen (or heard!) as an alarm clock. It's job is to wake us up. The shofar's job is to wake us up to think about what we've been doing and how we've been living.

"How are we doing? - SHO-FAR SHO-GOoD!" We blow the shofar to get us ready to do the Hokie Pokie. It's time to turn ourselves around. It's time to do Teshuvah - to turn ourselves around - to turn away from what we've been doing wrong and towards what we can and should be doing right.

Thus, on our Opening Day of Religious School, I had the audacity to tell the students and even the parents too that I had a homework assignment for them! Yet, still, you know how we were doing? "SHO-FAR SHO-GOoD!" Even with the mention of homework, no riot ensued. The homework assignment was to go home, look into a mirror, stare into the eyes of the person looking back at you, and ask that person three questions: 1) what did I do last year that I shouldn't have done, and how am I going to try and not do that in this new year? 2) what did I not do last year that I should have done, and how am I going to try and actually do that in this new year? 3) what did I do last year that was so GOoD, and how am I going to try and do more of that in this new year?

I encourage everyone in the congregation to do this assignment. Go home, look in a mirror, stare into the eyes that are looking back at you, and ask that person the three questions above. Ask those GOoD questions, and be prepared to have a GOoD conversation with that person looking back at you. Be prepared to do the Hokie Pokie. Be prepared to turn yourself around. Hear the shofar and let it be the alarm clock that it can be. Let it wake you up. ... and, you know how we'll be doing? "SHO-FAR SHO-GOOD!"

Chesed means "kindness" in Hebrew. The word can also be translated as lovingkindness," to convey the deep love that animates Jewish acts of kindness, done without thought of reward.

The Bible has numerous examples of chesed, such as Abraham and Sarah welcoming three strangers to their tent in the heat of the day; Abraham's servant's prayer for a wife for Isaac, answered by Rebecca who offers water to him and to his camels; and Ruth, who shows loyalty and kindness to Naomi, adopting her religion and peoplehood, after Naomi has experienced great loss. The rabbinic tradition enacted many laws to formalize our commitment to kindness, making OUR GIFT TO YOU chesed one of the three central pillars of Jewish life, as Shimon HaTzaddik taught: 'The world rests on three things, on Torah, on service of God, and on deeds of kindness" (Pirkei Avot 1:2).




