THE HISTORY OF JEWELRY

Jewelry has existed throughout history, from ancient times to the present, with pieces dating back 90,000 years or more. Early jewelry often consisted of found materials, such as shells, wood, stones, feathers and other natural items, but many of those pieces had significant meaning behind them.

In Judaism, the Star of David represents the solidarity of the Jewish people, making it a symbol of religion and culture when worn in jewelry. Some groups in the Middle East and northern Africa regions believed the Star of David brought good luck.

Jewelry provides people with a physical symbol to represent meaning, ideas, values and rituals. Those symbols can change the way the owner feels while wearing the jewelry. A symbol of protection might make the wearer feel strong and safe.

The symbols in jewelry also work to convey your feelings toward another person. When you gift someone a piece of jewelry that represents loyalty, you are showing the recipient that you will be loyal in your relationship or friendship. This symbolism often makes jewelry more meaningful and important to the owner.
