### FROM THE RABBI'S DESK



#### Five Ways to Get Ready for Your Seder Rabbi Nesson

The weeks leading up to Passover are the busiest period in the Jewish calendar. There is so much to do, including a house to clean and meals to prepare. Let's not forget that we do all of this to prepare for the Seder. So, I dedicate this article to five ideas to help make our Seder experiences meaningful.

**Number One:** *Shehecheyanu,* **"Thank you for letting us reach this day."** One of the first things we do at a *Seder* is to sanctify the day with a blessing over wine and Kiddush. Then we recite *Shehecheyanu*. I love this blessing. Beyond telling the story of the exodus, we pause on Seder *night* to say thank you – we have reached another Passover, another special moment in our lives. As you begin the Seder, why not ask the people around the table what reason they have to recite the *Shehecheyanu* this year. The birth of a child? A graduation? A new job? Or maybe you have done something you never did before – you ran a marathon, learned something new, or made a new friend. Before the Seder begins, stop to catch up with the people around the table. Bring people together with shared memories.

Number two: *Kol Dichfin Yetei Veyeikhol*: "All who are hungry come and eat." At the start of the Seder, we invite those who are needy to join us at the Seder table. This statement is a bit out of place-it is too late to invite people on the night of Passover. Perhaps we should think of this idea right now. Take some time to think about someone who may not have anyone with whom to celebrate Passover. Take extending this invitation seriously. Look around and think: who needs an invitation? Hunger may also not just be for food. People need and want community on these nights. No one wants to feel lonely or alone on the nights of the Seder.

Number three: *Mah Nishtanah*, "How is this night different from all other nights?" Asking questions is front and center on the Seder nights. This year, my suggestion is that you send all your guests an email – tell them admission to the Seder is one question about Passover or Jewish life. Or you can come up with some of your own questions and ask your guests to think about them. For example: Should we apply the story of Passover to other enslaved people and refugees today? Or, how does this year's Seder differ from last year?

**Number Four:** *Avadim Hayyinu*; "We were slaves to Pharaoh in Egypt." Passover is an opportunity to do an inventory of our freedoms. Think of Norman Rockwell's 'The Four Freedoms'. What does it mean to be a slave? Is it only physical? What are the things that enslave us psychologically? Spiritually? Or the other side of the coin. What does it mean to be free? How much are you willing to put your life on the line for that freedom as the people of Ukraine have been doing for the last year? What is the relationship of freedom to responsibility? What responsibilities do we have as American Jews toward the political situation in Israel? Any of these questions will keep us busy all night. As you prepare for Passover, take the time to come up with topics for discussion and debate.

Number Five: Kol hamarbeh lisaper biyitizyat mitzraim mishubach; "Anyone who dwells at length on the story of the Exodus is praiseworthy." The Haggadah states, "Each person is obligated to see himself/herself as if he/she personally went forth from Egypt." The Seder is more than just a story; it is about coming to recognize that we are part of the stories we tell. Mitzraim, Egypt, is not just a place but a state of being. It's often pointed out that the word Mitzraim can be read "Maytzarim," literally "narrow straits." If we look at our lives, let us tell our own story of liberation from the narrow straits of illness, anxiety, and fear. We all have a story to tell. We need to share our own story at the Seder along with our ancestors' stories.

### PASSOVER INSTRUCTIONS FOR PREPARATION

### A SPECIAL NOTE- If you have room for guests at your seders or if you would like an invitation to a Seder, please be in touch with Rabbi Nesson 973-538-9292 or ravdjn@aol.com

This year Passover begins April 5th and ends Thursday Night, April 13th. The Fast of the First Born, or Siyum, is held on Wednesday, April 5th at 7:45am. A Siyum (conclusion of the study of a portion of the rabbinic literature) is held at the conclusion of the morning Minyan followed by a Seudah Shel Mitzvah so that the first-born may eat.

Bedikat Chametz (the search for Chametz) occurs on Tuesday evening, April 4th at sunset. The Chametz should be burned by 11:30am on Wednesday, April 5th. The stove should be koshered for Pesach and all cooking done using Pesach pots and utensils. Bedikat Chametz sets are going out in Purim baskets!

#### Foods:

Labels and tags marked "Kosher L'Pesach" are of no value unless they have a rabbinic signature. This also applies to products manufactured and grown in Israel.

Forbidden for use: leavened bread, cakes, biscuits and crackers, cereals, wheat, oats, barley and all liquids which contain ingredients or flavors made from grain alcohol. Rice, dry beans, and peas (kitniyot) are not consumed by most Ashkenazic Jews. Sephardic Jews and others who eat kitniyot may eat these products.

Permitted for use requiring NO "Kosher L'Pesach" label: in unopened packages or containers. These foods require no Kosher L'Pesach label: natural coffee, tea, sugar, salt, pepper, vegetables (except peas and beans).

Permitted for use if certified for Passover use by a competent rabbinical authority: Passover flour, Passover noodles, candies, cakes, beverages, canned and processed foods, milk, butter, cheese, jams, jellies, relishes, dried fruit, salads, oils, vegetable gelatin, shortenings, wines, vinegar, and liquors.

#### **Dishes and Utensils:**

Only dishes and utensils specifically reserved for Passover should be used with the following exceptions:

- Table silverware made wholly of metal, if used during the year, may be used on Passover if thoroughly scoured and immersed in boiling water. Table glasses may be used after scouring. Fine china ware, if not used for a year is permitted.
- Metal pots and pans used for cooking purposes only (but not for baking) if made wholly of metal though not used during the year, may be used on Passover if first thoroughly scoured and immersed in boiling water.
- Utensils used for baking during the year cannot be used during Passover. Earthenware, enamelware and porcelain utensils used during the year may not be used during Passover.
- The stove is prepared for Passover by thoroughly scrubbing and cleansing all parts and turning on the full flame in the bake oven with all the grates in the oven.
- A dishwasher may be used after thoroughly scouring with boiling water and the use of a new tray.

### **CANTOR'S NOTES**



### We Are Still Commanded to Tell the Story Cantor Shana

Over a recent Shabbat dinner, the discussion turned to the upcoming holiday of Pesach, and various approaches to the Seder we had experienced over the years: those families whose observance of the Seder remains the same, year after year, often following their beloved Maxwell House Haggadah word-for-word; those who put time and effort into preparing a creative, experiential, educational Seder each year; those who adapt something appropriate for the youngest children in the

room; and those whose seder can be described as minimal at best.

One of the fascinating things I find about Passover is this great variety in styles of Seders, and the vast collection of different Haggadot available -- not only the artwork, but approaches to the text itself, influenced by the time and place. We place great importance on teaching our children to ask the Four Questions, and the response to those questions found in the Haggadah itself is the stern reminder: "Even if we were all wise, all elders, all knowledgeable about the Torah, we are still commanded to tell the story of the Exodus from Egypt." Through this directive, every generation, in every time and place, is given the invitation to determine what it means to do just that: to tell the story of the Exodus, using the tools available to them, and knowing who their audience is.

My favorite tools with which to do this are the classic ones of text and music. The Haggadah itself provides plenty of texts, and from there comes the possibility of adding characters and situations, to bring drama and arc to turn the Seder table into an interactive theater. The poetic text of the Haggadah lends itself to music: the classic tunes we've heard since we were children -- many of us would even believe those tunes were passed down to Moses on Mount Sinai and sung by our ancient ancestors thousands of years ago -- as well as new tunes being written every year, or even overlaid onto the text from current pop songs. But there are more tools than only text and music available to us to tell the story.

For example, Rabbi Nesson loves to add more representative symbols to the articles on the Seder plate, creating opportunities to refer to other struggles for freedom from oppression throughout history. Artists create amazing artistic versions of the Haggadah, finding ways to represent and re-interpret the characters and stories told within it as well as the representative food actions it describes through images and color.


While there are traditional texts, guidelines, and directions, the beauty of the Pesach Seder is that there is no one way to do it -- it is up to each individual gathering around that Seder table to determine what exactly it means that it is a "mitzvah upon us" to tell that story, to remind all four of the "types" of children the Haggadah describes that "we were slaves in Egypt, but now we are free", and to ask the questions of what that means for us, here and now, in this generation and in the next.

We wish a sweet and creative Passover to each of you and your families!

### **Continuing Our History**

When I welcomed Rabbi Adam Gillman to Morristown in February, he immediately asked me what made our synagogue special and what was most important to me as president. While I hadn't prepared to be interviewed myself, the answer was obvious. We're an old synagogue, I explained. We'll be 125 years old in January, and we've got a beautiful old building to show for it. We've got a rich history. But we don't rest on that history alone. Rather, the energy, excitement, and enthusiasm that Cantor Shana

and our Minyonaires bring to services, that our Shalom Yeladim kids and Religious School students bring into the building every day, and with which our warm and caring faculty, clergy, and staff welcome them and their parents to classes and to our many educational and social events – that's why we're here, and what keeps us going. It's about being able to continue our history for another 125 years.

If you want to know what we're about, all you had to do was follow around our Education and Program Director, Miriam Loew, on Sunday, March 5<sup>th</sup>. That Sunday morning started off as most do in our building, with Miriam and her Religious School faculty and staff welcoming K-7 students into our building for another day of learning, singing, and interacting with their peers. But Religious School ended early that day, so that the kids could join their parents and other community members for our annual Purim shpiel. This year's pirate-themed adventure, directed by Cantor Shana and written by her son Ilan, was an absolute delight, and kudos to our 6<sup>th</sup> and 7<sup>th</sup> grade students who did an amazing job performing in front of a large crowd.





As soon as the shpiel ended, it was time for a carnival! Our last big carnival was in March 2020, just as we were about to begin social distancing for longer than we could have possibly imagined. This year's carnival, I'm pleased to say, was very social and involved very little distancing. There was food (hamantaschen, of course, and hamantaschen-shaped pizza), and opportunities for the kids to make their own hamantaschen. There were bouncy castles. There was face-painting, thanks to our own Rockey Cornell, aka Queen Vashti. There were masks to be painted and groggers to be assembled. Most importantly, there were a lot of people, and there was a lot of fun to be had. My thanks to the Religious School and Shalom Yeladim parent volunteers who put so much work into the event, along with Amy Stover and our custodians Isaiah Ward and Marco Tello. And thank you to Miriam for organizing such a wonderful event!



But Miriam's day was just beginning when the carnival ended. She had two more events to go! First up that afternoon, Miriam led a group of 9 of our Religious School and youth group participants to Lester Senior Living in Whippany, to spend time with the elderly residents there and bake hamantaschen with them. This outreach is part of the Better Together program spearheaded by Miriam, for which she helped us obtain a \$30,000 grant. It's truly a wonderful program – rewarding for both the seniors and the kids.

Next, Miriam brought a group of 16 USY kids to the Game Vault in Morristown for an afternoon of pre-Purim fun. Our

USY chapter, under Miriam's leadership, has been growing in recent months, and attracting interest from both member families and non-members. Partially in recognition of the growth in our USY chapter, USY has chosen us to host their upcoming regional Spring Convention. If you see a lot of teenagers in our building on April 21

and 22, that's what's going on. We are delighted to be able to host this wonderful event, and again thankful to Miriam for all her hard work.

Finally, I would be remiss if I didn't point out two subsequent events in March that really highlight what we're all about. As busy as March 5<sup>th</sup> was, the next night was Purim proper. Cantor Shana cooked a wonderful dinner, and then led us in prayer and a very festive megillah reading. Numerous congregants, young and old, took turns reading from the megillah, while the audience drowned out the bad guy's name with plenty of noise. And what an audience we had, packed with young families and children, long-time members, and quite a few members of our Jewish Young Professionals group, which we are so happy to have with us. You'll be hearing more about this group, which has been drawing in more and more participants over the past few months, in the weeks and months ahead.



And on March 19<sup>th</sup>, we hosted another successful Mitzvah Day, as volunteers packed our ballroom to pack bags of food and school supplies for those in need. We were honored to have with us the Deputy Mayor of Morris Township, Bud Ravitz, to thank the volunteers and present Rabbi Nesson with a proclamation thanking him for his 35 years of service to the community. My thanks to our Social Action Chair, Lou Bodian, along with Howard Buxbaum, for organizing such a great event.

Service. Learning. Prayer. Celebration. Community. Those things have been important to us for 125 years and will keep us going for many more to come.

### **Cornerstone Ceremony Anniversary**

Last month on March 3<sup>rd</sup> was the Anniversary of the cornerstone ceremony for our current building. Our building was completed and dedicated in November that same year. The photo and story ran in the New York Times. Unfortunately, even though the Times prides itself on having an extensive archive, they do not have this original photograph.

Long time Morristown residents will see the photo credit is attributed to Sandrian. I spoke with the owners of Sandrian Camera Store on South Street. It seems that when the store first opened, Mr. Sandrian continued his career as a part-time freelance photographer. Miles Sandrian, the third generation of the Sandrian family, explained that many of the prints and negatives from this time were not saved. There was a disagreement between siblings 70 years ago leading to the destruction of their archives.

This photograph is part of a three-part display. In addition to this photograph, which is displayed in the Coatroom Gallery, there is a photograph where each person is numbered. There are about 46 people in the photo, though some in the back will never be as their faces are obscured or blocked.



The third part of the exhibit is the key to the numbers identifying all the people in the photo as best as we could do.

Unfortunately, the other two cannot be displayed where they can be easily seen.

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Here is a funny story: Harold Krauss is in the photo. There is a boy behind the two scouts. He is wearing a hat. Harold told me he was not a member of the Congregation. He was the delivery boy from the florist who was a friend of theirs. His buddies suggested he get in the photo. So, it's a 1929 photo bomb!

### Learning & Preparing for What You're Afraid of Makes it Less Scary

Our world can be an unpredictable and scary place. You only have to turn on the evening news or click on your preferred news website, and you'll be presented with an unending series of unfortunate stories. This can make the world's events, even threats to your own community, seem overwhelming. In times like this, it's important to remember what many of

our parents taught us when we were very young—perhaps during a frightening thunderstorm or when we first became afraid of fire—that learning about what you're afraid of makes it less scary, and preparing for it makes it even less so. There are many famous quotes about knowledge and preparation that apply here:

- "Nothing in life is to be feared; it is only to be understood. Now is the time to understand more, so that we may fear less." (Attributed to Marie Curie)
- "Success depends upon previous preparation, and without such preparation, there is sure to be failure." (Confucius)
- "By failing to prepare, you are preparing to fail." (Benjamin Franklin)
- "Plans are of little importance, but planning is essential." (Winston Churchill)

At MJCBY, our synagogue, religious school, and preschool have and train on emergency response plans to give our congregants, families, and students the best chances to overcome any kind of emergency. We continuously review these plans to ensure they are updated, and everyone is familiar with them. While not required by authorities, MJCBY leadership takes its moral and ethical duty seriously to do everything reasonably possible to prepare and protect you and your family while you are in our building.

You can do the same thing in your household. While MJCBY's plans and procedures will necessarily be more complex than yours, there are many simple, low-cost steps you can take to prepare for emergencies. The federal government's <u>www.ready.gov</u> website provides guidance for how to make emergency plans and tailor them to your home (Do members of your household have specific medical needs or mobility concerns? Do you have young children that will need extra support, diapers, and baby food? This should be in your plans and kit!). Some helpful plans to think through include:

- Emergency preparedness plan
- Shelter and evacuation plans
- Family communication/reunification plan

The website also has great recommendations for what to put in your emergency kits (don't forget one in your car!) and how to teach your children about family preparedness in an age-appropriate manner. A little thought and preparation now can make a BIG difference in an emergency. We do this on a regular basis at MJCBY, but it's important to remember that you should do the same thing at home.

### **RELIGIOUS SCHOOL**



#### The Four Children & Jewish Education Miriam Loew, Director

The Haggadah in telling the Exodus story, introduces us to the famous four children: one wise, one rebellious, one simple, and one who does not know how to ask.

For each of them the Haggadah instructs us to find a way to retell the Passover story so that it is personally relevant and meaningful, considering that particular child's personality and ability:

The inquisitive, intellectually curious child? Teach them all the intricacies of the laws and tradition of Passover! The rebellious child who may be disinterested? There, too, we have a responsibility to find creative ways to capture their interest and to pass on our heritage and traditions to the next generation. The simple one? Engage them on their level, retell the story in easy-to-understand ways. And the one who doesn't know how to ask and is perhaps a bit apathetic to it all? We are told to "open it up for them" - to create an environment and opportunities that stimulate curiosity and learning.

The Haggadah challenges us as Jewish educators to meet all children where they are at, to respect their individual capabilities, personalities, and circumstances, and to ensure that all learners know they are welcome at the Seder table. It is our sacred responsibility to open a path for learning and Jewish connection for all our students. Here at MJCBY's Religious School we strive to create an environment in which all learners can thrive, just as the Haggadah inspires us to do.

#### Mitzvah Day was a complete success!

On Sunday, March 19th, Morristown Jewish Center Beit Yisrael celebrated our 2<sup>nd</sup> Annual Federation-sponsored Community Mitzvah Day event. Thank you to the more than 100 adults, teens and children who helped and/or made donations to cover the costs. We were part of more than 700 people who participated in a multitude of mitzvah activities for all ages and stages at 13 different locations throughout Greater MetroWest.

We at MJCBY have a history of community involvement from helping resettle Russian refugees in the mid-1980's, serving lunch at the Soup Kitchen since May 1989, being a Support Congregation for Family Promise, relieving staff on



Christmas Day at Morris View Nursing Home, helping prepare and serve lunch at NourishNJ, preparing almost 200 backpacks with school supplies for disadvantaged Morris School District students, serving lunch at Homeless Solutions shelter, and participating in Federation's Mitzvah Day.

For this year's mitzvahs, we packed 500 Breakfast Bags that contained cereal, shelf stable milk, fruit juice, fruit cup, a granola bar and spoon with napkin. We also assembled over 40 Purposeful Acts of Kindness (PAK) bags containing personal hygiene items. Lastly, we put together 24 backpacks crammed with school supplies for Head Start students.

We were also honored to be the venue where Rabbi Nesson was presented a proclamation for his 35 years of service to the community and MJCBY. Morris Township Deputy Mayor, Bud Ravitz, presented Rabbi with a plaque from the Township Committee.


The non-profits we support include:






