FROM THE RABBI'S DESK



Unmasking the Hidden, Purim in 2023! 'MeSheNichnas Adar Marbim B'Simcha: 'From the moment that Adar begins, our joy increases' Rabbi Nesson

Jewish tradition urges us to celebrate Purim not just for a few days but from the very beginning of the month of Adar. On Monday evening, March 6th, and Tuesday, March 7th we will read and commemorate the story of Purim.

At first blush, the story seems simple. It features a beautiful Queen, and her smart cousin Mordechai, a 'not too with it' King Achashverosh, and a petty if not downright evil Haman whose heart's desire is to annihilate the entirety of the Jewish population. By the end of story, we celebrate Esther's bravery with revelry and joy. So, we dress up in costumes and 'merry, merry be' as the song goes.

There is a lot for *Megillat Esther* to teach us. It is about Jewish life in the diaspora (outside the land of Israel). It is about Jewish identity - hidden and revealed. It is about the presence of G-d in Jewish history, also hidden and revealed. The story also provides a deep look into the first organized anti-Semitism of history, how those with anti-Semitic attitudes advance their views, and how we can respond.

Haman sets out to destroy the Jews after he becomes incensed by Mordechai's refusal to bow down to him. When he lobbies the King for a decree to advance his genocidal campaign, Haman employs the anti-Semitic trope that will be used in history for centuries to come. "There is a certain people ... dispersed among the peoples in all the provinces of thy kingdom; and their laws are diverse from those of every people; (Esther 3:8).

The irony is that in the Purim story, this claim could not be further from the truth, Achashverosh's life is saved by Mordechai HaYehudi (the Jew) and the King's Jewish queen. It is at this moment that Esther unmasked her identity, which had been hidden, for her sake and the sake of the people.

In today's world, anti-Semitism has made a comeback. It is both blatant and hidden. We are called again and again to be the Jewish people we are meant to be, not hidden, but revealed.

This is why Megilat Esther ends with joy and with light.

"La-yehudim, hayta orah v'simcha, v'sasson, vikar – For the Jews there was light and gladness, joy and honor."

Yo-ho Yo-ho! A Pirate Shpiel for Me Cantor Shana

Ahoy mateys! In our house, Disney's *Pirates of the Caribbean* movies have always been a big favorite. Not only do we occasionally gather around and re-watch the movies as a family, but the music has also become part of the soundtrack to our lives, whether in the car, or at home. Hans Zimmer's energetic, zingy score is energizing and great fun.

So, a couple of months ago when I told my son Ilan that I wanted a pirate-themed Purim Shpiel this year, his eyes lit up and he started writing and coming up with new lyrics to the songs to match Esther's story, as only an enthusiastic theater-obsessed high schooler could. With editing help from his older sibling Lux, Ilan found that it was not hard to marry the plot of the Book of Esther to stories of piracy. After all, the Megillah includes a subplot of attempted regicide which can easily be called mutiny, on a ship, not to mention secret identities, a good dose of irreverent humor, and Esther's hutzpah to approach the king without an invitation.

What neither Ilan nor I realized is that there actually is a history of Jews who were pirates in the 16th century. Thanks to Morristown High School Latin teacher and friend of the synagogue Lyn Berman, on the morning that our 6th and 7th Grade class were set to first read through the Shpiel that he wrote, she sent Ilan a link to a handful of clever videos about this very subject.

"Pirates? PIRATES! No one told me about pirates!!!" Ilan noted indignantly as he forwarded the link to me, pointing out this



tragic gap in his Jewish historical education. We watched the videos together and learned that there were indeed Jewish pirates, mostly because of the Spanish Inquisition in 1492. If you put "extra history Jewish pirates" into a Google search engine, the videos will pop right up. If you'd prefer to read books about the subject, the videos suggest: A Man of Three Worlds: Samuel Pallache, a Moroccan Jew in Catholic and Protestant Europe by Mercedes Garcia-Arenal and Jewish Pirates of the Caribbean: How a Generation of Swashbuckling Jews Carved Out an Empire in the New World in Their Quest for Treasure, Religious Freedomand Revenge by Edward Kritzler.

Happy reading, Happy Purim, and may you have a fair wind ever and always!

PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE



Our Community and Our Future

If you were at MJCBY on February 3rd or 4th of this year, you might have been confused into thinking it was the High Holidays, or at least a Bar or Bat Mitzvah taking place. Parking spaces were hard to come by in our lot. The pews were packed. People who hadn't been in the building much, or at all since the start of the COVID pandemic, were mingling with old friends. But instead of extra-long services and fasting, we had regularlength services followed by delicious food and choice beverages in the ballroom – a Tu

B'Shvat seder and dinner on Friday night, and a Kiddush luncheon on Saturday.

People were gathered that weekend to meet and greet, and listen to and learn from, a candidate to succeed Rabbi Nesson as our community's spiritual leader. I've written in prior columns about the rabbinical search process now underway at MJCBY for the first time in 35 years. This column isn't about that process though. Rather, this column is about us – our community, which turned out in significant numbers (mostly in person, but also online) and with tremendous energy that weekend, with a focus on our future.

Like many non-Orthodox congregations (and mainline Christian churches), our numbers have declined in recent years. The rules of the Rabbinical Assembly and the United Synagogue of Conservative Judaism divide Conservative congregations into four categories by size — with A as the smallest and D as the largest. Once upon a time, MJCBY was a larger Category B synagogue. Today, we are a larger Category A synagogue, where newly minted rabbis often apply to hone their skills shortly after graduating from rabbinical school (more experienced rabbis tend to apply to larger congregations, to which more junior rabbis are ineligible to apply).

But on that weekend, "small" is not a word that would have properly described us. Our sanctuary and ballroom were packed. Our youth were on full display – from the amazing Minyonaires leading Saturday morning services, to the young man who gracefully recited the year's longest Haftarah, to the two young children who happily carried mini Torahs in the Torah procession (full disclosure: my son was one of them). The crowd was engaged – and well fed. People were thinking about and talking about (we're not a group to keep our opinions to ourselves) what they want in a rabbi, and what they want for our congregation's future. No one was wondering whether we would survive. Rather, they were sharing their thoughts as to how we would thrive.

The weekend was a tremendous success, as almost everything went according to plan. For this, I have a lot of todah rabah's to extend. My thanks to Josh Charm and the members of the Rabbi Search Committee for making and executing on very detailed plans, including Lori Brooks, who ran the weekend's planning for the committee. Thank you to Amy Stover and our custodians, Isaiah Ward and Marco Tello, for getting the building ready for, and then cleaning up after, a lot of usage that weekend. My thanks to the leadership and faculty of Shalom Yeladim and the Religious School for laying out the red carpet for our special guests. Todah rabah to Cantor Shana for feeding the masses – cooking for over 120 people on Friday night, preparing and then leading our best-ever-attended Tu B'Shvat seder, and then leading the Minyonaires at services the next morning. My thanks to Dorothy Cohen and the Sisterhood for putting together a spectacular Kiddush on Saturday. And to everyone else who hosted, informed, and entertained our special guests throughout the weekend, thank you.

And finally, my sincerest thanks to all of you who showed up in person or online. It was freezing cold outside that weekend, but I was inspired by our warmth as a community. The turnout and engagement by our congregation made me optimistic about our future, and proud to be your president.

This of course rings true for Purim as well. The Purim story is a tale of tenacity and survival, of great leadership and courage, and of the strength and hope of



SECURITY CORNER



A Balance between Being Welcoming and Being Safe

We learn from an early age that a healthy life requires proper balance. As a child this means learning to balance school and play; as an adult this calculation grows to encompass all aspects of life, such as work vs. family time, spending vs. saving money, practicality vs. luxury. As a Jewish community, we face the same conundrum

when it comes to our security. How do we balance the need to maintain a warm welcoming environment with our obligations to keep our community safe and secure?

The MJCBY community has what it takes to provide a welcoming environment for current and potential members—our building is full of smiling congregants, active committees, engaging programs and services, and children who feel that this is their home. While these are the essential foundations for growth and health within a synagogue, they must be balanced with appropriate security measures to ensure our longevity and safety.

We recognize that in our current world, with antisemitic propaganda rife on social media and frequent attacks against Jewish facilities, it is our obligation, and it is expected of our leadership, to take appropriate security measures to keep those within our community safe. In essence, we need to temper our hope and trust with a little bit of caution. Security incidents this past month in Bloomfield, NJ, San Francisco, CA, and at our own MJCBY illustrate this starkly. An individual threw a Molotov cocktail at Temple Ner Tamid's front door, another individual shot blank rounds inside a Chabad, and our own office staff received a suspicious phone call. Law enforcement responded in each case, and at MJCBY we immediately implemented additional security measures. This included near-constant communication amongst leadership, increasing screening of anyone wishing to enter our building, adding Door Greeters for services and events, and hiring armed guards and/or active-duty police officers and police patrols to be present when anyone was in the building while the threats were unresolved.

The leadership at MJCBY, including the security committee, wants you to know that we are actively working to maintain the appropriate balance between welcoming and safe. We have processes behind each event, service, and program we host to evaluate security needs, ensuring that everyone can access our wonderful programs while security controls access to the building itself. We are constantly in contact with local, county, and state law enforcement and emergency management to make sure we become aware of threats and get an immediate response. We are also continuing to train our staff and volunteers in security and emergency procedures and will be running regular security drills with religious school and Shalom Yeladim students.

Circling back to the need to balance security with a welcoming environment, the security measures we have put in place are intended to keep you and your family safe while here—so you can enjoy your time with us and not live in fear.

RELIGIOUS SCHOOL



No Mention of G-d in the Megillah? Miriam Loew, Director

As we prepare our students for the holiday of Purim, we challenged some of our more advanced readers to count how often each Purim character is mentioned in the Megillah. We counted 24 mentions of Achashverosh, 10 mentions of Vashti, 57 mentions of Mordechai, 55 mentions of Esther, and 51 mentions of Haman. We challenge you to count as well and let us know if we got it right!

We were surprised to notice, however, that G-d is never mentioned in the Megillah once! A Jewish holiday and a ritual text and no mention of G-d? Our teachers explained to us that this was not a mistake, but that Esther and Mordechai very purposely omitted any mention of G-d from the Megillah. This surprised us yet again. Esther and Mordechai were the Jewish leaders at the time, tasked with leading the community through a very difficult time when they were facing annihilation by the evil Haman. Surely, they must have helped our Jewish ancestors tap into their faith in G-d to carry them through their fears and the threats they were facing. Then how is it that when they recorded the story for all posterity, they did not make mention of G-d even once?

We learned that as true leaders they wanted to leave us and all future Jewish generations a message. They wanted us to remember that just like the Purim story, our lives are filled with events that often seem like a string of coincidences, happenings that just seem ordinary and not especially miraculous. Esther and Mordechai's message to us though was to look closer and look for G-d's presence even in our day to day lives. They wanted us to remember that even at times when we may not feel G-d in our lives, we can challenge ourselves to find meaning and beauty in ordinary things. We can choose to see everything around us, even the most mundane parts of our lives, through a lens of awe and gratitude. The stars in the night sky - ordinary or miraculous? The intricacies of our brain and the incredible neurodiversity among us - is it just coincidence or might there be something greater at play? The discoveries we continue to make about the vastness of space - isn't it awe inspiring?

This Purim let's take Esther and Mordechai's message and look for ways our ordinary looking lives might actually be quite miraculous, awe inspiring...and divine.

PASSOVER INSTRUCTIONS FOR PREPARATION

A SPECIAL NOTE- If you have room for guests at your seders or if you would like an invitation to a Seder, please be in touch with Rabbi Nesson 973-538-9292 or ravdjn@aol.com

This year Passover begins April 5th and ends Thursday Night, April 13th. The Fast of the First Born, or Siyyum, is held on Wednesday, April 5th at 7:45am. A Siyyum (conclusion of the study of a portion of the rabbinic literature) is held at the conclusion of the morning Minyan followed by a Seudah Shel Mitzvah so that the first-born may eat.

Bedikat Chametz (the search for Chametz) occurs on Tuesday evening, April 4th at sunset. The Chametz should be burned by 11:30am on Wednesday, April 5th. The stove should be koshered for Pesach and all cooking done using Pesach pots and utensils. Bedikat Chametz sets are going out in Purim baskets!

FOODS:

Labels and tags marked "Kosher L'Pesach" are of no value unless they have a rabbinic signature. This also applies to products manufactured and grown in Israel.

Forbidden for use: leavened bread, cakes, biscuits and crackers, cereals, wheat, oats, barley and all liquids which contain ingredients or flavors made from grain alcohol. Rice, dry beans, and peas (kitniyot) are not consumed by most Ashkenazic Jews. Sephardic Jews and others who eat kitniyot may eat these products.

Permitted for use requiring NO "Kosher L'Pesach" label: in unopened packages or containers. These foods require no Kosher L'Pesach label: natural coffee, tea, sugar, salt, pepper, vegetables (except peas and beans).

Permitted for use if certified for Passover use by a competent rabbinical authority: Passover flour, Passover noodles, candies, cakes, beverages, canned and processed foods, milk, butter, cheese,

jams, jellies, relishes, dried fruit, salads, oils, vegetable gelatin, shortenings, wines, vinegar, and liquors.

Dishes and Utensils:

Only dishes and utensils specifically reserved for Passover should be used with the following exceptions:

- Table silverware made wholly of metal, if used during the year, may be used on Passover if thoroughly scoured and immersed in boiling water. Table glasses may be used after scouring. Fine china ware, if not used for a year is permitted.
- Metal pots and pans used for cooking purposes only (but not for baking) if made wholly of metal though not used during the year, may be used on Passover if first thoroughly scoured and immersed in boiling water.
- Utensils used for baking during the year cannot be used during Passover.
 Earthenware, enamelware and porcelain utensils used during the year may not be used during Passover.
- The stove is prepared for Passover by thoroughly scrubbing and cleansing all parts and turning on the full flame in the bake oven with all the grates in the oven.
- A dishwasher may be used after thoroughly scouring with boiling water and the use of a new tray.


