FROM THE RABBI'S DESK



Tisha B'Av & Tu B'Av

Rabbi Adam Gillman

Dear MJCBY community,

I am filled with gratitude and appreciation for beginning my role as the rabbi at MJCBY. My fiancée Leah and I have been blown away by the warm welcome we've received! We're just beginning to see why you call Morristown and MJCBY home. We look forward to getting to know you in the coming weeks and months.

We find ourselves in the joy of summertime, and yet we are in the middle of a period of mourning known as *The Three Weeks*. In Hebrew, this time is called "Bein Hametzarim" - בין המצרים or "within the straits" or "narrow places," which is taken from Eicha (The Book of Lamentations), which we read on Tisha B'Av - the 9th of Av.

Lamentations 1:3

Judah has gone into exile
Because of misery and harsh oppression;
When she settled among the nations,
She found no rest;
All her pursuers overtook her in the narrow places.

The period begins with the fast of the 17th of Tammuz, to which tradition ascribes several catastrophes, most notably the breaching of the walls of Yerushalayim by the Romans and the incident of the golden calf at the foot of Mount Sinai. The period culminates with the most somber day of the Jewish year, Tisha B'Av - the 9th of Av, which marks when both temples were destroyed, the first at the hands of the Babylonians in 586 B.C. and the second by the Romans in 70. The second destruction was a national calamity that ended Jewish sovereignty in ancient Israel and began our existence outside of the holy land in galut (exile).

As a day of intense mourning, we take on practices that mirror that of Yom Kippur. We fast, refrain from washing, having sexual relations, using perfume, and wearing leather. During this period, we also recall the horrors we've endured as a people across history, including the Inquisition and the Shoah. In contemporary times the themes of the climate crisis and the many divisions and forms of hatred are present in our current climate both locally and globally.

To say this period is a heavy one would be a grave understatement, yet just a week later, on the 15th of Av, comes Tu B'Av, the holiday of love. Tu B'Av contrasts the doom and gloom of mourning with connection, celebration, and care. Michael Strassfeld, a contemporary Rabbi and author, notes that Tu B'Av comes seven days after Tisha B'Av; it serves as a symbolic ending of the shiv'ah - the seven days of mourning for the dead. I am reminded of the words of The Rev. Dr. Martin Luther King Jr., who taught that "*darkness cannot drive out darkness; only light can do that. Hate cannot drive out hate; only love can do that*". May love guide us as we mourn past and present events. And let us hold space for the aish tamid, a continuous and ever-lasting fire that lights our path into celebration and the new year of 5784.

CANTOR'S NOTES



Tu B'Av – The Obscure Holiday of Love Cantor Shana

It is a common stereotype that Jews love to kvetch and complain, but in contrast I must point out that we also love to celebrate, evidenced by the large number of holidays in our calendar, possibly too many for many of us to keep track of or remember.

The most well-known modern dichotomy representing a sad day followed by a celebratory one is Yom HaZikaron -- Israel's day of remembrance of fallen soldiers and victims of terrorism -- followed immediately by Yom Ha'Atzma'ut, Israel's Independence Day. An even more ancient take on this switch from sad to happy takes place in the summer month of Av, when we swing from the sad day of Tisha B'Av to the lesser known but joyous date of Tu B'Av.

Tisha B'Av is the 9th day of the month of Av, in which we mourn the destruction of the Jerusalem Temple and the brutal massacre of the Jews living there at the time by the Babylonians in 586 BCE and by the Romans in 70 CE by fasting for 24 hours and chanting the book of *Eikha*, Lamentations.

Tu B'Av, six days later on the 15th day of Av -- the full moon of that month -- is "one of the most joyous days of the Jewish year", according to our *luah*, the guide to the yearly Torah readings, holiday observances, and customs by Rabbi Miles B. Cohen. He describes that during the 2nd Temple in Jerusalem, "the 15th of Av marked the beginning of the grape harvest, in which the daughters of Israel would dress in white and go out to the vineyards to dance. Young unmarried men would follow after them in the hope of finding a bride." This ancient version of JDate is described briefly in the Mishna at the end of tractate *Ta'anit*, which describes fast days in the Jewish calendar. https://www.sefaria.org/Mishnah_Ta'anit.4.8?lang=bi

Tu B'Av sounds like it could be a parallel to Valentine's Day. Why is it so unknown? My theory is that unlike just about every other Jewish holiday, there are no special foods, no texts, no songs, nor prayers, and no rituals that are continued today. The one way that the day is marked, according to our *luah*, is that the *Tahanun* prayer -- a text of repentance asking for forgiveness recited as part of the regular daily service somewhat reminiscent of Yom Kippur, is skipped that day.

We haven't sent our unmarried young people out into the vineyards dressed in white to dance and meet up on Tu B'Av for the past two thousand years, though that does sound like fun. Maybe the practice should be restarted!

PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE

Attendance has been up at Shabbat services in recent weeks. And I'm not just talking about Shabbat in the Park, when we get good attendance from all the generations comprising our congregation. Rather, at Friday night and Saturday morning services in our building over the past two months, there have been more people, more energy, and more buzz at the Friday dinners and Saturday kiddushes following services. As I enter my second year as President of MJCBY, I'd love to think this is because of me. Of course, it's not. Rather, it is because we find ourselves at a unique moment in MJCBY's almost

125-year history, and people want to witness it firsthand. The 35-year tenure of a rabbi has come to an end, and a new rabbi – representing a new generation of the Jewish people in America – has taken the helm.

This unique moment follows a unique period of time for us. The COVID pandemic, with the social isolation and rise of online services it entailed, interrupted our normal habits and intergenerational traditions. This, combined with the growing presence of Chabad and rent-a-rabbis, not surprisingly leads many people to wonder: why bother belonging to a synagogue?

As your President, I would love to stress to everyone that maintaining our historic building and retaining our wonderful clergy and staff cost a lot of money. Just paying for tickets and meals several times a year doesn't come close to covering our expenses.

But why is it important to keep us going? Because, whether we know it or not, we all need a community around us that shares our values. Friendly folks to be there for us in good times and bad. Teachers to instill in our children a Judaism consistent with our values – one filled with respect for the past and for Jewish law and teachings, but that at the same time accepts modernity, honors gender equality, and focuses on making the world a better place, not just for Jews.

Several months ago, the MJCBY Board of Directors, on the overwhelming recommendation of its Search Committee, chose Rabbi Adam Gillman to lead this holy community. His energy and fresh ideas, we concluded, would not only resonate well with our current membership, but also help us reach out to new residents in the area. This includes young families that may want the Judaism we're offering but don't automatically feel the need to join a shul in the way their parents and grandparents did. As we now welcome Rabbi Gillman and his fiancée Leah to Morristown, we should all keep this in mind: if he is successful as a rabbi, then we will be successful as a community.

Of course, change is hard, especially generational change. Different generations approach Judaism and what it means to be a Jew, and where the synagogue fits into their lives, in different ways. Different generations also approach the State of Israel differently. Older generations remember a time when the State of Israel was new, its survival uncertain, and memories of the Holocaust were all too fresh. Younger generations may find less reason to doubt Israel's continued existence, but more reason to be worried about its place in the world, particularly considering the continuing conflict between Israelis and Palestinians, and the escalating conflict between the various factions in the Knesset. But despite these differences, a rabbi – our rabbi – must be able to connect with all the generations that make up our community, embrace the diversity of opinions we hold, and educate and support all of us.

I can go on about how confident the Search Committee and Board members, myself included, are with Rabbi Gillman's abilities in this regard, including on matters relating to Israel. But congregants need not rely on proxies to feel connected to their new rabbi. Rather, every congregant should reach out and get to know him directly. And he's made doing so very easy. He has an easy email address to remember: rabbi@micby.org. And he has a Calendly page available, through which you can book an appointment to meet with him: <https://calendly.com/rabbigillman>. Or just come to services and speak with him beforehand or afterwards, as many have in recent weeks.

As we enter a new fiscal year for MJCBY and get ready to start a new Hebrew year, I encourage all of you to remember what makes this community so important and so special, and to think about how we can improve this community, and what each of you can do to help make it better. And I ask that you stick with us through this period of transition and help make it a time of positive transformation – for the synagogue, for our community, and for each and every one of us.

This is in addition to the regular cost of our programming and staff.

Our board of directors understands that there is a limit to how many fundraising requests our members are prepared to consider. Given the future promises as MJCBY welcomes a new rabbi, works to repair our physical structure, and continues the legacy of excellent programming, we hope you will consider matching your previous contribution to the Kol Nidre fund, and supporting that effort with at least an \$18 contribution today. Like the Education Fund, we aim to start the next fiscal year with 100% participation from our congregation for both efforts.

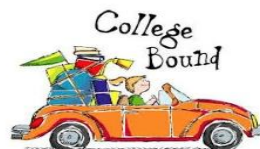

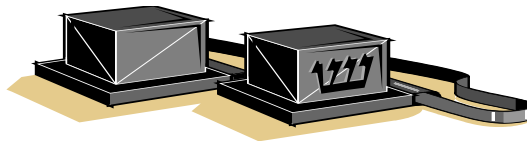

Also, Rosh Hashanah will be here before you know it! Shofars for kids of all ages! Did you know?

The very first reference to the shofar is in Genesis when Abraham was about to sacrifice his beloved son Isaac. As an angel stops Abraham, we are told that a ram gets caught as his horn is tangled up in a thicket. The animal gets substituted for Isaac. Hence, we are taught that the shofar represents continuity and a hopeful future.

A long and loud shofar blast marks the end of the fast day of Yom Kippur. While the blower must first take a big breath, the shofar only sounds when the air blows out. This is a symbol for Rosh Hashanah: we must turn inward to fix ourselves so we can then burst out and contribute to the world.

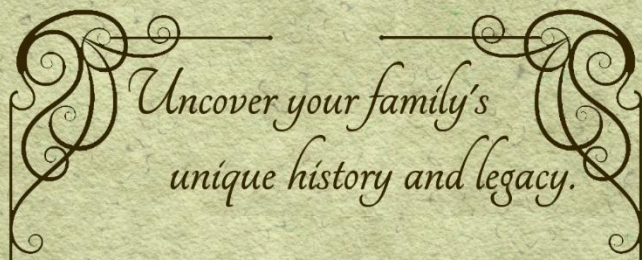
