# FROM THE RABBI'S DESK



# **Ushpizin** and **Ushpizot**: Welcoming Guests Across Time into our **Sukkah**

Like many other aspects of our tradition, celebrating cannot be done alone. This might be why we are commanded to welcome guests through the *mitzvah* of הַּבְנָסַת - *Hachnasat Or'chim*, "welcoming guests" into our homes and communities,

and during our pilgrimage and harvest festival. We must share in what we have, anywhere from simple to abundant.

Beyond welcoming folks into our *sukkot* for a good meal of connection and conversation, we also participate in the *Kabbalistic* tradition of welcoming mystical guests, the *Ushpizin* (the Aramaic word for guests), into our temporary dwelling. Traditionally, there is one guest for each night of *Sukkot*. Seven guests in total. They include the three *patriarchs*: *Abraham*, *Isaac* and *Jacob*, *Moses*, *Aaron*, *Joseph*, and *King David*, often referred to as the "*Seven Shepherds of Israel*" because they guided our ancestors physically and in their spiritual development, just as a shepherd guides their flock.

In recent years, these guests have expanded to include women - ushpizot (the feminized form). Often but always, our Ushpizot are the seven prophetesses listed in the Talmud: Sarah, Miriam, Deborah, Hannah, Abigail, Huldah, and Esther.

The *minhag* (custom) of inviting the presence of biblical ancestors welcomes us to expand the list of potential guests from contemporary or historical figures to relatives who are no longer in this world or other important figures from our lives.

Beyond our biblical ancestors, who would you like to symbolically invite into your Sukkah, be it physical or metaphorical, this year? Think of seven people - historical, biblical, ancestral, or fictional that you wish could celebrate *Sukkot* with you this year. Each night of *Sukkot*, spend a few moments thinking about each person. Imagine what it would be like to be in their company.

- What would you like to talk with them about?
- What questions would you ask?
- What would you want to tell them?
- How would their presence make you feel?
- What foods would you serve, and what songs would you sing?

May we all be blessed to join together as a community, to gather with family and friends in our sukkah. May we be joined by those who have come before us and continue to influence and guide our path.

# If you want Shabbat dinner, come to Friday night services!

"Do you *like* to cook? I mean, for all these people?"
A relative newcomer to our synagogue asked me this question on Erev Rosh
Hashanah, after an excellent and dedicated kitchen crew made up of Andrea Needel,
Gigi Schwartz, Sue Salsberg, John Salsberg and I had prepared dinner for close to a

hundred people.

This should have been an easy question to answer, but at that moment, I found myself flustered and unable to answer. For the rest of the week, I felt myself wanting to explain how I ended up taking on the slightly bizarre but nevertheless fulfilling task of making Shabbat and holiday dinners happen at MJCBY.

Friday evenings are my favorite time of the week. I love Kabbalat Shabbat: the music, the texts, the rhythm of that particular service, with its inclusion of the experiences of lighting candles and saying kiddush over a cup of wine. I have very clear and happy childhood memories of Friday nights at my own cozy hometown shul, my family singing along with the congregation, the stories our rabbi would tell in his mild German accent and running up to the bimah for kiddush with my sister (she loved the Manischewitz, I hated it, the congregation found this contrast hilarious). I knew that historically, services on Friday nights used to begin at 8:15pm, but when I started my position as hazzan at MJCBY, my children were young enough that they would have turned into tiny insufferable monsters if we tried to keep them awake that late. Wanting not only my own kids but all the children of the synagogue to have the opportunity to experience Shabbat evening services on a regular basis, I begged for our services to start earlier, and for a while we switched back and forth -- some weeks early, some weeks late. This created more confusion than it was worth, and eventually we settled on the regular 6:15pm time slot.

The question then, however, was what to do about dinner. Perhaps, those with excellent planning and preparation skills and a crockpot or two would have the wherewithal to have a nice Shabbat dinner prepared far enough in advance on Fridays that it was possible to come from work to shul and then go home to a nice dinner ready and waiting for them. I was never that person. Friday night dinners were a very rare event for our family, because I found that close to the shul as I lived, I still somehow couldn't pull together everything I needed to do on a Friday to be able to have dinner ready when I came home from shul. Even if I had, all the back-and-forth was exhausting. How could I expect anyone else to do so, and how could I ever have anyone over for Shabbat dinner, if I was never sure exactly what time or whether dinner would be ready? (Besides, my kitchen table is pretty small, and my driveway is impossibly steep.)

What I did notice was how many more people came to shul when we held a Shabbat dinner right before or after services. Whether for a speaker or special event, at Freedom Park for one of our barbecues, or outside under the Sukkah, everyone wanted to be here when we were serving dinner. On those Shabbat evenings, the chapel or the sanctuary would be filled with voices happily singing along to Lekha Dodi and V'shamru, and the evening felt exactly like a Friday night should.

I can't remember exactly when I realized that the solution was simply to make dinners myself every week. It might have been after I cooked dinner for a couple of Tu Bishvat Seders, or more likely after my older child's Bat Mitzvah. I never was much of a cook myself, but I come from a long line of Italian women with big families who would cook for enormous crowds at least every week, if not more often, in tiny kitchens, because that was just how it was done. I realized that a simple dinner from not-so-expensive ingredients was quite easy to make, especially in MJCBY's big spacious kitchen full of cooking utensils. The dinners themselves seemed to come out just as good if not better than what the caterers would provide. And I found that I loved the communal activity that happens when we all work together to bring the food out, and even clean up afterwards. When everyone takes part in the project of making dinner happen, the synagogue kitchen becomes everyone's kitchen; and the tables themselves around which we gather acquire a status closer to our own dining room table at home. Best of all, the conversations we're able to have and the relationships we're able to build, relaxed around a Shabbat dinner table, are exactly what we're looking for after a long week.

So, to answer the original question: yes, I have found that I actually love cooking big Shabbat dinners at MJCBY, for everyone who comes to join us. Sue and John Salsberg are with me just about every Friday to help, bringing their much-appreciated skills and expertise. So please, join us for Shabbat dinner at MJCBY. Just let me know you're coming so I make sure there's a seat for you!

# PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE



Just Show Up

In my remarks to the congregation on Rosh Hashanah, I spoke about standing on the threshold between memory and hope, between the known and the unknown. The days of being able to take a synagogue like ours for granted are a memory. The future of an institution like ours, with its significant building maintenance and personnel costs, and facing competition from a variety of sources, is unknown. And that is worrisome. While there are other places to daven and celebrate, and other ways to learn about our heritage, bringing these strands together in one

magnificent place, surrounded by a caring community that supports one another and shares the same Conservative Jewish values, is a beautiful thing. A meaningful thing. Something worth fighting to preserve.

But I am hopeful. I am inspired by the generosity of so many of our members, who so graciously give of their time and money. And I am inspired by the leadership of our creative and dedicated clergy, staff, officers, board members, and committee chairs, who maintain the traditions of MJCBY while working tirelessly to make it relevant, accessible, and appealing to both existing and potential members, and especially to our children.

I also spoke about the importance of all of us showing up – to learn together, serve together, and take part in the events and activities that help define who we are as a community. Thankfully, the month of Tishrei gives us plenty of opportunities to show up. Because while Rosh Hashanah and Yom Kippur 5784 may already be memories, we have three (or is it two? Or one? Ask the Rabbi!) more holidays to come:

- **Sukkot** begins on Friday evening, September 29th. We will usher in the holiday with "pizza in the hut" for our children and their families, Shabbat and festival services that evening and the next morning, and a community dinner. On Sunday morning, October 1st, we will have festival services overlapping with a special session of our Religious School, followed by a kiddush luncheon inside our community sukkah underneath a brand new, kosher *schach* (roof). If you've never shaken a lulav and etrog, or witnessed a *hoshanot* procession with lulav and etrog, come! If you want to have a nice *al fresco* lunch with friends, come! And afterwards, make sure to come see us at our other Sukkot booth at the Morristown Festival on the Green.
- Shemini Atzeret takes place on Friday night, October 6th, and Saturday, October 7th. That Saturday morning, we will recite *yizkor* prayers for the second time in 5784. But unlike on Yom Kippur, we'll have a kiddush luncheon to enjoy following the service.
- Simchat Torah starts on Saturday night, October 7th, and lasts until nightfall on Sunday, October 8th. We will read from the Torah both on Saturday night and on Sunday morning. But because the start of the holiday will be delayed by Shabbat, and because Sunday morning would ordinarily be a Religious School Day, we will move the usual festivities that accompany the evening service to the morning service, to enhance participation. If you've never seen what an unrolled Torah scroll looks like, come! If you want to hear the final verses of the Torah chanted, only to moments later hear the first verses of the Torah joyfully recited, come! There will be a couple special aliyot given out (more on this to come), but everyone who comes gets an aliyah, including the kids. It's a lot of fun, and I hope you'll join us for this special day.

Simchat Torah is a fitting way to end the holiday season. Just as we turn the page on one year and go right into a new one on Rosh Hashanah, so we happily conclude our annual reading of the Torah and immediately start the next year's reading on Simchat Torah. We keep it going, year after year. Just like MJCBY.



# **SECURITY CORNER**

The Security Committee usually employs this space in the newsletter to update you on improvements to our security systems and ask for volunteers. This month, however, we need to change direction and talk about one particular threat to the Jewish community – swatting—and what we can do in response.

Unfortunately, our adversaries have realized that they can disrupt Jewish life at synagogues, JCCs, and day schools without ever being present on the property. Law enforcement and emergency services are obligated to respond to every call they receive, so if an adversary calls 911 falsely claiming that a bomb has been planted on the property, that gun shots have been heard in the building, or that someone is being held hostage, police and emergency services from all over the county will arrive in force. These agencies have no way to determine whether a threat is a hoax unless they physically inspect the building. This phenomenon is known as "swatting." It is technically defined as "the deliberate and malicious act of reporting a false crime or emergency to evoke an aggressive response (often a SWAT team [Special Weapons and Tactics team]) from a law enforcement agency to a target's residence or place of work or religious establishment," often frightening unsuspecting civilians in the building.

Adversaries commit swatting attacks for many possible reasons:

- To terrorize a targeted group or community
- To misuse already overstretched police and emergency services' resources
- To gain attention for political, religious, or ideological causes
- In retribution for perceived grievances
- To watch as the targets are evacuated and traumatized (often via livestream)

The threat of swatting attacks is not farfetched. During this year's High Holy Days alone, multiple Jewish facilities in northern New Jersey were victims of swatting. These included:

- Congregation Ahavat Achim in Fairlawn: 911 caller claimed they had planted two bombs in a black backpack.
- Temple B'nai Jeshrun in Short Hills: A call was made to a suicide hotline that an individual was threatening selfharm in a bathroom.

In each case, law enforcement responded, and services were disrupted or shut down. In some cases, attendees had to be evacuated and guestioned. All threats were found to be hoaxes.

We cannot prevent swatting attacks from occurring. We can, however, educate ourselves on what to do in response. The simple answer is to carefully follow police guidance at the time. If police receive a threat against MJCBY, they will arrive and inform our staff. We will shelter in place and will *not* evacuate until the police have cleared our evacuation routes and assembly locations. Only then will our staff initiate evacuation procedures for congregants and students, in partnership with the police. Our clergy and staff have been trained in what to do and are kept up to date on potential threats to our community.

This does <u>not</u> only mean monetary support but also your thoughts, suggestions, needs, and desires. Your input is vital and necessary for MJCBY to grow and thrive into our next century.

Our board of directors understands that there is a limit to how many fundraising requests our members are prepared to consider, and that is why our 5784 campaign will be asking you to pledge for both Kol Nidre and the Education Fund together. Be on the lookout for a pledge card with this year's High Holiday information. We will be reaching out to each of you in the coming weeks and look forward to talking about how your generosity will help ensure a continuation of our spiritual home. If you would be interested in hosting a small gathering, we would be delighted to talk about MJCBY funding with you at any time.






