FROM THE RABBI'S DESK



Disagreement: "The Secret Sauce of Judaism" Rabbi Adam Gillman

Dear Friends,

As we continue to navigate these challenging times, disagreement and debate often take center stage. It's easy to think of disagreement (*makhloket*) as something negative, something to avoid. But in truth, disagreement lies at the very heart of Judaism. A teacher of mine once called it the "Secret Sauce" of Judaism—an essential

ingredient that has helped us grow, adapt, and thrive across time and space. Our tradition is built on passionate debate, discussion, and respectful argument, whether it's a Talmudic discussion between ancient rabbis or debates on the superior babka (chocolate or cinnamon). This isn't new; it's a distinct element of our very fabric.

One of the core teachings that guides us in navigating disagreements is the concept of *makhloket I'shem shamayim*—" disagreement for the sake of heaven." This is the type of disagreement where the goal is not to "win" or to dominate but to arrive at a greater truth or deeper understanding. It's about elevating the conversation, seeking clarity, and building a stronger community through respectful engagement, even when we don't always agree.

At this moment, we are living through a particularly painful and divisive time for the Jewish people. The world feels fractured, and the weight of our challenges can be overwhelming. But this isn't the first time we've faced adversity. Our history—and the wisdom of our ancestors—teach us that our survival, renewal, and growth come from leaning into *makhloket* and using it as a tool for building up, not tearing down.

So, how do we navigate these differences in such a charged time? One important way is to embrace *makhloket l'shem shamayim* by asking the right kinds of questions. Rather than avoiding disagreement or labeling those we differ from as adversaries, rather we can ask:

- What's really at the heart of this disagreement?
- What values or principles can we agree on?
- What is the deeper truth we might be seeking?

When we start from a place of curiosity and humility, disagreement has the potential to become a learning opportunity, not a threat.

In today's climate, where it's easy to draw lines and divide ourselves, we need to be particularly mindful of how we react to differences. Since October 7th, many of us have reassessed who's "with us" and who's "against us." That instinct is natural when we feel under threat. But in the process of circling the wagons, we may be modeling something unhelpful for our loved ones—especially for the youngest members of our community. We may be teaching them that disagreement is dangerous or that they need to tread carefully around us. This isn't the message we want to send.

Instead of reacting to disagreement defensively, we have the choice to respond with our own agency and strength. We can set an example for our families and communities by showing that it's possible to maintain firm beliefs while also acknowledging and respecting the diversity of opinions. We can ask:

- How can we, as a community, approach these differences with integrity and compassion?
- How can we benefit from each other's perspectives and views of others, even when we don't agree?

The Talmud is filled with examples of disagreements that ultimately strengthened the Jewish people. The debates between the houses of Hillel and Shammai come to mind as a paradigmatic, for example, fostering a relationship and engagement of serious debate and conviction, but were rooted in a respect for one another and the desire for a deeper understanding of our tradition. Both sides were heard and valued, and the process of *makhloket* became sacred.

In our community, let's commit to honoring *makhloket l'shem shamayim*—" disagreement for the sake of heaven." May we strive to demonstrate to our loved ones and the world around us that disagreement, when handled appropriately, is not something to dread but something to welcome. As we enter this new year of 5785, may we do so with our hearts and minds as open as they can be, embracing the power of constructive disagreement and honoring our tradition's call to seek truth together.

CANTOR'S NOTES



The Sound of the Shofar Cantor Shana Onigman

Each year I give my 6th and 7th graders a worksheet sometime in the week or two leading up to Rosh Hashanah, checking in to review the basics of the shofar: what it is, when and how it is used, what the various calls and sounds are. The most interesting answers I get are in response to the why questions: "Why do we sound shofar? What is the purpose?" and "What is the history / biblical story of the

shofar?" A few years ago, when I had a class full of blank stares (uh oh), I told them to get creative and make something up, which resulted in some particularly crazy stories that had several kids giggling for the rest of the day. This year, apparently I've got some students who must really be paying attention, because in response to the question about the origins of the shofar, one of them promptly told me the story from Genesis that we read on the second day of Rosh Hashanah ending with Abraham's decision to sacrifice the ram in place of his son Isaac; (yes!) and another student guessed (correctly) that the shofar was used to call fighters to battle in times of war (yes, again!).

My personal favorite explanation of why we hear the shofar on the Days of Awe is an outgrowth of the ancient original use of the shofar in times of emergency. Before our modern methods of communication, the shofar was used to announce all sorts of impending disasters, including war, plague, famine, and drought, for some examples. Since we have developed modern methods of communication and announcements and the shofar is no longer needed for the sake of calling our attention to external threats, I like to think of the shofar as calling our attention to the possibility of an *internal* threat, that of no longer caring about the difference between right and wrong. What we are trying to do on these days of hearing the shofar is assess what we have been doing wrong and what we have been doing right and make decisions about what to change. The emergency to which we need to be alerted is that there are some flaws, some mistakes of judgment and character in ourselves, and we need to gain awareness of them and care enough to change them. Hence, the shofar, calling us to action.

The scholar Saadia Gaon penned a list of ten reasons we hear the shofar on Rosh Hashanah in the Middle Ages. Even though they already had a really good sense of the shofar and why we sound it, I had my students read this list as well. The sage had written that Rosh Hashanah is like the coronation of a king, in that we crown God the ruler over the world that God created, and coronations are accompanied by trumpets. A third brilliant student proceeded to ask the Question of the Day about that statement: Why do we have to keep crowning God as the king every year? Hasn't God always been the Ruler, from the very beginning? The best questions are the ones that I can't answer right away.

I did manage to say something in the moment about how there are many symbolic things we do the same every year, just as we read the same Torah and prayers every year, and that there are always Jews who are new to these symbolic moments and can learn from them, and that we ourselves can experience these rituals in a new way because each of us is a little different, older, wiser, changed in some way from the previous year. This year, considering the journey and changes in the Jewish community over the past year, and the changes that loom in the months ahead, our symbolic rituals can take on even more significance: both in the comfort of what stays the same, year after year, and what values we affirm by upholding them, especially in the face of the changes and uncertainties we see in the world around us.

May the sound of the shofar bring in a healthy and beautiful 5785 for you and your loved ones!

This year, like every year, the MJCBY Security Committee crafted a security plan for the High Holidays. This plan is always developed in collaboration with local police and the Morris County Office of Emergency Management to ensure collaboration at all levels. This is the most visible time of year for the Jewish community, and we must do everything possible to preserve our congregants' safety and security as they enter our space, pray, and leave for

home.

We recently sent out an E-Blast requesting security volunteers for the High Holidays. Please don't take these requests lightly – WE NEED YOUR HELP. Security is a community responsibility, and we need to take care of each other.

We are our own best, first, and last defense. Please volunteer for as many position types and shifts as you can. Volunteering helps keep your fellow congregants and their families safe and ensures that services proceed smoothly, but it's also a great opportunity to take a break, greet old friends, and meet new ones!

We need volunteers for the following positions each day, taking turns in easy 45-minute shifts:

- Usher Chapel Door Attendant
- Usher Sanctuary Door Attendant
- Usher Sanctuary Seating
- Usher Alternative Service Door Attendant
- Usher Rotunda Greeter
- Door Greeter Front Entrance
- Door Greeter Eastern Entrance

Several of these positions can be done while seated (e.g., Chapel and Sanctuary door attendants), and we welcome volunteers at all levels, ages 16+.
